Simple Present Tense



Objective

By the end of this lesson, you'll:

- **Understand how to form the simple present tense.**
- **Use it in affirmative, negative, and question forms.**
- **Apply it in real-life scenarios.**



Introduction to the Simple Present

The Simple Present tense is used to describe:



Facts: Something always true.

Example: The sun rises in the east.

Habits/Routines: Things done regularly.

Example: I brush my teeth every morning.

General Truths: Things that are always true under normal conditions.

Example: Water boils at 100°C.

Scheduled Events: Fixed future events.

Example: The train leaves at 6 PM.



Structure

Affirmative: Subject + Base Verb

Example: I walk to school.

Example: She walks to school.

(Add 's' or 'es' for third-person singular subjects: he, she, it)



Subject Verb

Example:

I	play football.
You	read books.
He/She/It	eats breakfast.
We/They	go to the park.



Rules for Third-Person Singular:

We add -s to most verbs:

For example: He runs.

For verbs ending in -o -ch, -sh, -x, -s, -z, add -es:

She watches TV.

For verbs ending in consonant + y, change -y to -ies:

He studies English.

Negative

Subject + Do/Does + Not + Base Verb

Example: I do not like coffee.

Example: She does not eat meat.

Subject Structure

I/You/We/They

He/She/It

do not (don't) + verb

does not (doesn't) + verb



Questions

Do/Does + Subject + Base Verb?

Example: Do you play tennis?

Example: Does he work here?



Structure Example

Do + I/you/we/they + verb?

Does + he/she/it + verb?

Do you like music? Yes, I do. / No, I don't

Does she enjoy cooking? Yes, she does. / No, she doesn't.



Time Expressions

Common words that go with the simple present:

Always: I always drink water in the morning.

Usually: She usually walks to school.

Often: We often eat dinner at 7 PM.

Sometimes: He sometimes reads before bed.

Rarely/Seldom: They rarely go to the beach.

Never: I never eat junk food.



Routine/Habit:

Example: I wake up at 7 AM every day.

She goes to the gym twice a week.

General Truth:

Example: Cats sleep a lot.

The Earth orbits the sun.

Fixed Schedule:

Example: The bus arrives at 8:30 AM.
